# TWO THUMBS UP ON Watercolor Journals

#### AN ONGOING PLEIN AIR SERIES BY PAST PRESIDENT KATHY RENNELL FORBES



I love to work in small journals when traveling or creating small studies in the field or in the studio. I reviewed four popular brands, each has their pluses and minuses (not too many). I did not look at any journals that were less

than 140lb paper as I would have become frustrated and not a happy painter.

#### Here are four favorites:

- Strathmore Series 400
- Hahnemuhle tinted
- Indigo Art Papers Handmade Watercolor
- Fabriano Watercolor Journal

I would use all of these again, but my subject matter would help determine my selection. The first three are currently available at Binders Art Supplies & Frames (www.bindersart.com) in person shopping or online. The Fabriano journal is currently only available in Italy.

**Strathmore Series 400** (5.5x8.5") has a slight texture and a warm cream color. The hardcover has the feel of soft leather. The book is stitched and lies flat with the help of clips. If you want a bright white paper, this may not work for you. After paint dried, this paper dried flat. It did take dry brush but not as well as others that had more texture. It accepts pen and ink well as paper is smoother. It also worked well with watercolor markers, which I then applied water to.

Hahnemuhle Tinted Journal (6x8.5") had a light bluish-grey tint. I thought it would require white gouache, but once pigment was applied it did not change or alter the colors. Was pleasantly surprised that the pigments were so bright. If you want bright white, another brand would be preferable. This hard cover journal has a grey cloth fabric. In addition, it has a built-in band to keep the book closed and a red cloth string for a page marker. The pages did not dry as flat as the Strathmore. When doing panoramic be mindful that watercolor may pool along the spine.

Indigo Art Papers (6x9") uses handmade watercolor paper that is a brighter white. Because it is handmade it buckled more than the other papers while painting. Great for landscapes in the country but harder to use for cityscapes with straight edges. It did flatten out with slight curling around the deckled edges. All other journals had a hard edge cut. This journal also has semi-transparent velum paper in between each sheet of watercolor paper. Used for protection and you could also sketch on it with permanent ink or pencil. It lies totally flat due to the rings. The black hardcover

feels like slick leather. The pages are easily removed if you like. If you want to do a panoramic on two pages you would need to remove the velum page. This page is slightly larger than the others and had the most texture, so excellent for dry brush. Colors also blended very well on this paper.



A study of "Parisian Geraniums"

**Fabriano Watercolor Journal** (5.75x8") has a brighter white paper with excellent texture, making it very nice for dry brush. The journal lies totally flat with the coil rings. I did need to clip edges while painting and they dried mostly flat. It accepts collage as well without curling. The rough texture wears out fine tipped pen

and ink and can catch the nibs. The hardcover has a rectangular opening which can be used as a view finder out en plein air. It allows you a glimpse of the cover page making it easily recognizable or identifiable (one of my favorite features). It is no longer available in the USA, but can be ordered from Italy at <a href="https://www.fabriano.com/it">https://www.fabriano.com/it</a>.

Hopefully this makes you want to try one of these journals on your next painting outing. I would highly recommend all of them depending on what effect you want to achieve. ## HONORARY MEMBER & WATERMEDIA MASTER GERALD BROMMER

Born in 1927, Gerald Brommer died on November 3, at 93 years old. Brommer grew up in Northern California and then studied to be an educator in Nebraska, where he earned a Master's degree. After moving to Southern California, he received instruction in watercolor painting from Watson Cross, Noel Quinn, and Robert E. Wood. At the beginning of his career he taught geography and painted whenever possible. Gradually, he phased out the geography classes to allow more time to paint and teach art.

A collage and landscape master, Brommer wrote several books including: *Emotional Content: How to Create Paintings that Communicate, Watercolor and Collage Workshop, Collage Techniques.* 

GWS extends sincere condolences to Mr. Brommer's family and to all families of members that we hold in memory.


