

FROM THE PRESIDENT

My brother recently played golf with a former professional player. The pro told him to step back on his right foot ten inches before swinging. While my brother is already a great

player, this small adjustment helped him add another 50 yards to his drive—a huge improvement, and one he may never have achieved without the guidance of the pro.

Whether it's on the golf course or behind an easel, the principle is the same. There is no substitute for inperson learning. That is why I was disappointed to see that attendance at the recent Fealing Lin workshop was not quite what we anticipated. Fealing was phenomenal. My question to you is, why is attendance low?

Are you among the growing wave of artists turning to online video tutorials?

My students tell me that they have been watching videos, and, though they have learned from them, it is not like having an instructor available to give you individual help. For example, my students may see that their paintings are not turning out as they wanted, but could not see why. I am able to look at their work and give a personalized suggestion: that they had too much

water, not enough paint, using the wrong size brush, needing to soften edges, etc. Without this guidance, they may continue to struggle (and may even decide watercolor is not for them), when a small change is all it takes to advance their talents.

Are you an advanced artist and do not feel you will learn?

Learning from another professional will often uncover new techniques, new approaches, new equipment, new colors and more. I was in a class with an accomplished artist who excelled at fine detail work, and the instructor asked her to paint with a large brush. This helped her move to an even higher level. I have seen instructors personally demonstrate calligraphic strokes for artists who needed to add more detail/interest. One instructor told my mother to put away her purple (which she tended to overuse). Only another professional artist observing you in action will catch many of these tweaks.

Of course, you have to be open to learn in a workshop. You have to actually go out of your comfort zone and try new things, even though your painting might end up being the worst in the class. If you actually try to paint as the instructor requests, without falling back into your

old habits, you will learn and gain much more than you might realize. The Georgia Watercolor Society works hard to bring you a variety of workshops throughout the year—opportunities for you to advance as an artist—and I encourage you to take advantage of them!

As I end my term as your president, I want to thank the board members for volunteering their time and energy—allowing us to have shows with terrific awards, demos, and workshops. This year we had a record number of shows (five!) to publicize and organize. What an accomplishment! Your new president, Annette Bush, will do a great job continuing these efforts, and I hope you will volunteer, attend, and support the upcoming Georgia Watercolor Society activities.

MORE ABOUT KATHY RENNELL FORBES

Interview with Sam Alexander

What was your first experience with painting?

I remember my parents painted the basement walls in our house around the holiday season. I thought they were my new canvas to go with the markers I had received for Christmas. I had just finished painting Santa, his 8 reindeer and was starting on Rudolph on the second wall when I was caught in the act.

When did you realize you wanted to be a painter?

I knew it from the time I was in kindergarten and won a state award for a painting I did of a deer lost in a forest. I took as many art classes as I could in middle and high school, and then majored in art at UGA. Sadly, just before I finished my student teaching, the state of Georgia determined they were eliminating art and music in the schools due to budget constraints.

I then worked for a bank and IBM, while raising my family. While living in Hawaii I resumed painting and continued classes when we returned to Atlanta.

Who/What has influenced your art?

Many people have influenced my art, starting with my high school art teacher, Carol Hale, and Bill Thompson at UGA. I have also been inspired by local artist Dolores Kennedy, and workshop (& video) instructors: Mel Stabin, Mary Whyte, John Salminen, Ian Stewart, Stan Miller, Joseph Zbukvic and most recently, Vlad Yeliseyev.

I paint in acrylic, oil and watercolor, with the later being my favorite due to its fluidity, transparency and magic.

What drew you to outdoor painting?

My passions, besides family and art; are being outdoors and traveling; I am very blessed to be able to now combine all of those in my art career.

How has your art changed over the years?

My art has become more confident, looser and bolder.

What advice do you have for new Plein Air painters, such as tips on how to paint quickly on the spot?

Two secrets for all painters, especially plein air painters: always create a value study first.

Second: continue to work at your craft, paint and sketch everyday possible in the medium of your choice.

AN INTERVIEW by Rosemary Segreti

WITH ANNETTE BUSH, THE NEW PRESIDENT OF GWS



How have you stayed interested in watercolor all these years?

Watercolor makes ITSELF interesting! Just when techniques get boring...or a new process pops up in a different medium on board or panels...a sketch or a series demands the versatility of watercolor on paper. Sometimes just finding a box of old sketchbooks or paintings pulls me to an idea I want to explore again in watercolor!

You are a returning President. Tell us more about why you want to be President again.

Across the years I have come to appreciate the opportunities which I have had because of my connections with both the Georgia and the Southern Watercolor Societies—things I could never put on a bucket list because I could never dream of some of them—places, people, opportunities! When the call came this year asking if I would serve again, I knew it was time to give back.

Who are some of your favorite artists/teachers?

I seem to be inspired most by things I don't think I can do! Ed Betts, Georg Shook and Charles Reid were a few of the artists who influenced the Georgia Watercolor Society's early years and who still influence my thinking today.

What are your favorite subjects to paint and why?

I like images that can be manipulated within the picture plane so that the pigment, water, and paper are free to contribute a much as I do. I often change my thought process to match what is happening on the surface in front of me. So, I guess it's not so much WHAT I like to paint as it is HOW I like to paint!

What is your finest moment as an artist to date?

There have been many: the week there were two ceremonial presentations of my work, the solo shows, the awards, the teaching in France, the workshop in Japan, but I think the responses of students have been among my finest moments.

What are your goals for GWS in the coming year?

I'd like to continue offering opportunities for terrific workshops for members and exhibitions to introduce the public to exceptional watercolor paintings. I'd like to add small events around the state that will not involve a lot of travel, but allow members to occasionally spend time with other Georgia Watercolor Society Members.




